We wish to thank Dave for his many years of dedicated service to this task, of gathering information and presenting all the information in a very organized fashion. Richard Ihlenfeld will join the Wexford Board, effective in August. Richard is serving after the resignation of Matt Thomas who had served for several years and moved out of state.

The annual Wexford Garage sale occurred on May 7th & 8th. Thirty-two households participated in the event. Publicity was via the Middleton and Madison newspapers and Craig's List. Feedback from several resident indicated that despite the weather, sales were very good and on par with expectations.

The Wexford Village Fourth of July Parade and Picnic will begin at 10 AM on Sunday, July 4th. Assembly of parade participants will occur at South Woodmont and Sawmill Road and follow along Sawmill Road, into the Wexford Park shelter. A traditional picnic will follow with hot dogs, drinks, and desserts with organized games for children of all ages.

All modifications to the exterior or changes in the building footprint of any Wexford residence must be reviewed by the Wexford Architectural Review Committee. We have received verification from the Director of the City Planning division, that the City of Madison will NOT approve any plans for any building permit unless it has been approved by Wexford Village.

The mowing of our greenways got off to a fast start, approximately 2-3 weeks earlier than usual and at press time,

this trend has continued. Our contract with Barnes usually anticipates the industry standard of twenty mows per year.

The Wexford Board is considering a contract to restructure and repave approximately 250 feet of the bike path adjacent to Applehill Circle and East Newhaven. This area is severely damaged by ground upheaval and tree roots. Additionally, the same contractor will resurface many bike path areas that failed to maintain resurfacing that was done during the summer of 2008.

The Board of Directors is also reviewing strategy as to how to maintain the integrity of the bike/walking paths. Less emphasis will be placed on the resurfacing and greater attention placed on filling any major and minor cracks. The paths have a life expectancy of several decades and the proper maintenance will delay any major reconstruction. An estimate for complete repaving would be in the range of \$500,000, based up present replacement costs.

The remodeling of the traffic circle at the intersection of Sawmill and Westfield Road has been completed with a widening of that area to allow easier passage for vehicles. Pedestrian crosswalks have been also been painted.

We have received word from the City that all garbage and recycling bins may be taken to curbside 24 hours before garbage pickup and returned within 24 hours. The bins must not be left in the front of the yard. The best place is in the garage.

Eight of the thirty-four Wexford circle islands have been cut, trimmed, and landscaped by members of the Wexford Board. Since we did not use a contractor, we saved several thousands of dollars with our only cost being a new chain saw for Wexford Village, which is free for any resident to use. We ask Wexford residents to contact any Board member if you have any concern about the appearance of your circle island.

We remind all Wexford residents that live adjacent to any of the bike paths, that bushes, tree and any plantings must be kept trimmed so as to not impede pedestrians or bikers. If there are any questions regarding ownership if the vegetation, please contact one of the Board members so that we can ascertain any responsibilities

We, also, remind all residents that the Wexford covenants and City of Madison statutes require that residents maintain their homes exteriors and maintain yards with the timely mowing of grass, trimming of trees and shrubs, weeding, and remove junk and litter in the yard, both front and back. This is an aesthetic and a good neighbor issue for all of us.

Wet Weather Means More Mosquitoes

Avoiding Bites and Enjoying the Outdoors

The mosquito season in Dane County started this past May but mosquito activity has been relatively low until now. Recent rainfall has spurred the emergence of a extra large crop of pesky mosquitoes that are causing problems in many parts of Dane County. The majority of the mosquitoes that are pestering us are the floodwater mosquitoes, which generally don't carry disease such as West Nile virus but can be a significant deterrent to our enjoyment of the many outdoor activities in Madison and Dane County.

The best way to protect yourself from mosquito bites is by keeping mosquitoes out of your house, wearing long pants and long sleeves while outside, and using a repellant that contains Deet, Picaridin (KBR3023), or oil of lemon eucalyptus. The US Environmental Protection Agency has a new tool to help pick the repellent that may work best for you. The tool can be found at:

While we cannot completely exclude mosquitoes from our outdoor activities, you can reduce their presence by eliminating standing water on your property that can provide excellent locations for mosquitoes to lay their eggs. These small stagnant water sources around our homes are especially attractive to the Culex mosquitoes that are most likely to be carrying West Nile virus in our area. To decrease your chances of being a mosquito nursery:

- Clean out clogged rain gutters,
- Change the water in birdbaths, wading pools, and pet water dishes every 3-4 days,
- Properly dispose of old tires, see the Recyclopedia for more information.
- Make sure that items on your property (boats, pool covers, pots, bird baths, etc) do not hold water for more than 3 4 days.
