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Wexford Board News by Don Michalski

The Wexford Board is in the midst of accepting contract proposals for the mowing of our greenways. As mentioned previously, we usually abide by the lawn care industry standard of 20 mowings per year. After all of the bids are received, the Wexford Board will review and accept a bid based upon cost, references, and past performance.

Winter has finally arrived, and just a brief note indicating that Wexford Village does have some obligations in removing snow from sidewalks in our area. We have about five specified areas that we have contracted for snow removal. This does not include any of the greenway paths, since they are not considered sidewalks. Typically, the pathways remain snow covered for most of the winter. Additionally, we usually do not respond to occasional light pole outages during the winter months, unless the situation presents an safety hazard, i.e., exposed wires, poles across the pathway, etc.

Just an update on the MGE cogeneration plant water project—Wexford Park vs. Odana Park. We have received good assurances from the Madison Mayor's office and MGE that the water reclamation project will not be located at Wexford Park. The Odana golf course site appears to be a better situation from an economic, engineering, and political perspective.

The Architectural Review Committee of the Wexford Board has the responsibility of reviewing proposed plans for any additions or modifications of the exterior of any Wexford Village Home. This was a directive that we received from the original developer (Voss) of the area. Room additions, decks, changes in external appearances of home must be reviewed by the Wexford Architectural Review Committee before the City of Madison will issue a permit. There are certain standards that must be followed by the Committee including the original covenants, previous or historical acceptances, good aesthetics, and common sense. If anyone has any question about and issue regarding the Architectural Review, please contact any individual on the committee that are listed on the Wexford Village website.

Alder News:

Greetings from your Alder,

Winter has finally arrived! After a December with record low snowfall, we have experienced two major snow storms in January. The City Streets Division has worked hard to keep our neighborhood streets clear and safe. I commend them for doing such a good job under difficult circumstances. Even though they are working hard, there may be some streets that need extra work. I you are experiencing problems in your neighborhood, please contact me, or the Streets Superintendent directly (Al Schumacher - 266-4680 -aschumacher@cityofmadison.com). Also, please remember that alternate side parking regulations are in effect from November 15, 2004 through March 15, 2005. You must park your car on the even side of the street on even days and on the odd side of the street on odd days. These regulations are enforced from 1:00 a.m. regardless of whether there is snow or not!

The past two months have been relatively slow in regard to city political activity. Traditionally, there is little activity in December and January, due to the holidays. Also, since the April, 2005 elections will include all aldermanic seats, many individuals are preparing for re-election or election. We are assured of having at least five new alders, as five current alders will not be running for re-election.

Alder Brenda Konkol has been holding a series of listening sessions in the City in response to the Economic Development Commission's report on how to make the City more friendly to business. The purpose of the meetings are to discuss the public's perception of city government. I had the opportunity to participate in the listening session at the West Police Precinct this past month. What I heard was that west side residents were concerned about the delivery of essential services (police, fire, and EMS), the delivery of basic services (public works, parks, libraries, streets, etc.), and the city's relationship with local businesses. I share these concerns. I would appreciate hearing from you regarding what you feel is important and what the city should be focusing on. I will share you comments with Alder Konkol and remember them as we deliberate future city initiatives.

The City is considering modifying its lobbying ordinance. There are proposals that are currently being discussed that will clarify the definition of lobbyist, expand the list of individuals who need to register as a lobbyist, and provide better education to help individuals and groups comply with the spirit of the of the law. The intent of the law is to provide a disclosure of anyone who is paid to influence the decisions that the City Council makes. I would appreciate your thoughts on this issue.

• Messages from Dane County Executive

In the 2005 county budget presented to and unanimously approved by the County Board, we held to a tough standard—limiting the tax levy increase to the rate of population growth plus inflation (3.49% this year). This restraint results in a decrease in the average tax rate from \$2.89 to \$2.70 per thousand dollars of equalized valued. Despite controlling spending, we've prioritized key public services. Those services include: public safety—reducing ambulance response time, continuing commitment to the Drug Court, offender halfway houses and the new Pathfinders program that contribute to public safety; human services—a successful grant application for \$450,000 over three years to benefit children and families in the Allied Drive area and to provide a model to improve our work with families county-wide; natural resources—a county-wide ban on phosphorus in lawn fertilizers reduce phosphorus in our lakes and help decrease algae; and more efficient government.
