Wexford Board News by Don Michalski

During the early morning hours of Saturday, April 9th, individuals(s) destroyed fourteen light poles and light along the bike paths from Thornhill Circle to South Woodmont Circle. The Madison Police did an investigation on that Saturday morning with only a few clues. In addition to the Madison Police Department, the police officer from Memorial High was also notified. On May 19th, we received notification of the apprehension of at least one of the individuals responsible for the vandalism. At press time for this Newsletter, we are working with the family of the individual and their lawyer to achieve a resolution to the situation. Total damage estimate for the incident is \$7000-\$8000. We wish to express our appreciation to those individuals who called Wexford Board members, identifying any suspicious behaviors within our neighborhood regarding this and unrelated events. Further updates regarding this episode will be provided.

On Wednesday, May 11th, Dave Dryer from the City of Madison traffic engineering department met with about 15 Wexford residents regarding the traffic calming project for Sawmill and North Westfield. After much discussion, it was somewhat apparent that 4 way stop signs do not work in this situation and speed humps are too cumbersome and annoying for many.

It appears that the prevailing feeling was the use of a traffic circle. However, a survey from City Engineering will be sent to residents within a defined area of that intersection, and hopefully will archive some sort of consensus.

The Wexford garage sale was held on May 6th and 7th. About 35 household participated. We would appreciate hearing from any participating households regarding any positive or negative situations with the organization, publicity, etc, of the event.

Mark your calendar for the Annual Fourth of July parade and festival. It will be planned for Monday, July 4th at 10 AM. Mote details will be published later and volunteers are desperately needed.

Alder News:

Greetings from your Alder,

The first Tuesday in April has brought forth the annual spring elections, including elections for all 20 aldermanic seats. We have six new members on the Common Council, replacing six alders who chose not to run for re-election. I am pleased and honored to serve as your alder for two more years. I will continue to serve on the Park Commission, Public Safety Review Board, Commission on People with Disabilities, and Pedestrian Bicycle Motor Vehicle Commission.

Once again, I walked along with the Police Department's Special Events team at the 2005 Mifflin Street Block Party. Police officials commented on how they were overwhelmed with the number of offenses that they witnessed. They were able to cite only a fraction of those who broke the law. This year's event will likely cost city taxpayers about \$100,000 more than last year. Furthermore, since the Police Department (and Sheriff's Department) allocated more than 100 officers to keep this event safe, there were fewer officers patrolling other districts in the City. I continue to believe that the Mifflin Street Block Party is a series of large private parties that has public security provided at public expense.

Because of the behavior exhibited at the Mifflin Street Block Party and Halloween, I have introduced a proposed "keg ordinance" that would regulate the sale and use of kegs of beer at private parties in residential districts. My proposed ordinance change will be discussed at the Public Safety Review Board, Alcohol License Review Board, and City Council over the next several months. I would like to know how you feel about Mifflin and Halloween, and what we can do to control them.

Recently, the Common Council debated and approved a resolution allowing illegal aliens the opportunity to apply for low interest loans through the City's Community Development Block Grant Authority to help purchase homes. I opposed this resolution, and voted against it.

Recently, the Park Commission received a request from the environmental committee of Progressive Dane requesting that we convert the Glenway Golf Course to an organic (pesticide free) facility. Progressive Dane wanted to demonstrate how a golf course could operate without pesticides. I opposed this effort, as did the Park Commission - the request was denied by a unanimous vote. Our parks and golf course staff are leaders in using integrated pest management techniques. They use non-pesticide methods where ever possible, and only use pesticides when other methods will not work. Eliminating pesticide use from golf courses would result in a deterioration of the courses, and a reduction in their use.

I want to thank everyone that braved the cold and wind to come to the Earth Day Park Clean Up. Garlic Mustard is a major threat to Wisconsin's woodlands. It spreads rapidly and in a few years can displace native woodland plants. Wexford Woods is full of Garlic Mustard and we need your help to remove it. The plants need to be pulled out by the roots, put into plastic bags and be collected with the regular trash for landfilling. Do not compost Garlic Mustard. We are still planning on bark mulching the trails in the woods this summer. Again we need help wheeling and dumping it on the paths. The mulch will be dumped at the park entrance to the woods. When you see it there feel free to start spreading.

Most of the special projects in Madison Parks are done by volunteers and funded by the area residents with matching grants from the Madison Parks Department. We need your help to keep our park and woods a great place to enjoy. Madison will have 2 park rangers this summer patrolling the Madison Parks in the evenings and on the weekends. They hope that this will help cut down on the vandalism in the parks and help provide assistance and education to park patrons.
