Messages from Dane County Executive Kathleen Falk:

Fall is here and I'm finalizing the 2006 county budget to submit to the County Board by October 1. I am grateful for the valuable priorities that citizens shared with me through phone calls, meetings, e-mails and public hearings. I genuinely appreciate you taking the time to communicate your interest in the matters that concern all of us. My budget will prioritize public safety and human services. I anticipate that the County Board will finish with the budget around Thanksgiving.

Land use continues to be the number one challenge people tell me they want county leadership on. How do we accommodate more than 60,000 new citizens a decade in a way that doesn't compromise many of the features that we love about Dane County? We've taken big steps by bringing diverse interests together, such as realtors, developers and environmentalists, but the biggest step is still ahead. Now that I've completed six months of listening/working sessions across the county on my Attain Dane initiative, I will produce a map of where citizens tell me they want our county to grow and what we want to preserve.

But kids are why I am in public office. With tremendous partnerships, we've built a number of truly innovative programs to help kids succeed. The Allied Drive Early Childhood Initiative (ECI) is one example, and the Madison Community Foundation is a key partner. The ECI focuses on home visitation and selfsufficiency through employment. The goal is that working parents will become a "natural" part of the home environments of children on Allied Drive. The ECI was selected as one of only thirteen programs in Wisconsin to receive funding from the Wisconsin Partnership for a Healthy Future. The ECI was also selected as one of only six programs in Wisconsin to be a model of how services can be coordinated most effectively.

One continuing initiative is the Huber/AODA Facility Study. It directly relates to my commitments in the areas of the well being of children and public safety. Alcohol and other drug abuse represent a tremendous drain on our community and communities across the country. Some of the costs can be measured in dollars, but the human costs are greater. We must get smarter about how we deal with crime in our community.

As we move into the last quarter of 2005, I am encouraged by the work that we have done together, and we need to do more. With your help we will continue to work smarter and better to reinvent government, use your tax dollars even more efficiently, protect our great natural assets, make sure children have better opportunities by helping their parents to get jobs, and lead on drug and alcohol treatment programs.

Thank you again for all you do to make this an even better community, and I hope that you have a wonderful autumn.

•Leaf pick up begins Monday the 3rd of October. Crews will be collecting in a cyclic pattern starting in the Monday's refuse collection district and when completed will move on to the Tuesday's refuse district and so on until the completion of the Friday's refuse district. Then this cycle will start over again. Each neighborhood will receive a minimum of three collections weather permitting. This cycle will most likely stop at the end of October.



Brush collection will occur on October 17th. Brush should be made ready for pick up by 7 a.m..

- Reminder that the recyclables collection is every other Wednesday, not weekly as before. Please remember to roll your new bin to the curb in an area away from overhead obstruction. Also make sure that the arrows on the lid are pointing toward the street.
- Garbage collection remains on Wednesdays as usual. The city will be providing garbage bins similar to the recycle bins some time next year. It will help our neighborhood stay litter free and looking nice if we refrain from putting out our garbage until the night before or morning of collection day.

- Wexford Walking Paths: The walking paths should be kept clear of any brush or tree branches hanging over them. If you have trees and shrubs along the paths, please be sure that they are properly trimmed so they are not interfering with the walkways. Also please remember to trim any branches that are near a lamppost so the light is not being blocked. Thank you for your help. Note: The city picks up brush on the 3rd week of the month.
- Ice Skating: It won't be long before the ground is white and the air is cold and refreshing. Time to start thinking about sledding and ice-skating. We want to flood the ice skating rink in the park again this year, but we need your help. Many volunteers are needed to put a fresh coat of water on the rink every night and to clear any snow off the rink. (The Parks Dept. will plow it for us if the snowfall is 3 or more inches). A great opportunity to get a little exercise this winter, meet your neighbors and enjoy the fresh clean air. Hoping to get about 40 volunteers so we can create a calendar to have 2 – 3 people assigned each night. Then you will only be scheduled about once every 3 weeks.
