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## *Wexford Board News by Don Michalski*

It was identified in last month's newsletter, that the Wexford Village annual fees have been increased to \$80 for single family dwellings and \$40 for duplexes and condos. This increase reflects the growing need for financial resources for our greenways and light maintenance.

It should be noted that the Wexford Board will continue to explore for savings with our annual budget. We will be assessing the number and locations of the approximately 110 light poles within our area. If we find areas of light overlap, we will ask the adjacent homeowners about their concerns and hopefully eliminate some duplicated lighting. Each light represents about 60 dollars in energy costs each year, in addition to our usual maintenance costs for \$4000 to \$8000 in repair of lights each year. Some of the costs reflect vandalism, but most reflects the aging of our electrical system.

The Wexford Board has also decided to publish the Wexford Directory on a bi-annual basis. The cost of each publishing is about \$2200. This past year, we were able to subsidize some of the expense by advertising in the book. We ask for your endorsement and support of these businesses. We have also explored the concept of an electronic directory or Wexford Watch, but have discovered that it would be too difficult to manage with the frequent movement of residents and changes of email addresses.

During February, we will be engaged in a jury trial challenging the Wexford covenants. This could be a very costly event, but the organization needs to pursue the trial in order to maintain the standards that have been established by the developer and the present Wexford residents.

Social events for Wexford will continue for 2007. Hillary Williams will be the social chair and will truly need the support and participation of many residents for the Easter Egg Hunt in April, Garage sale in May and the Fourth of July party.

With the arrival of spring, many residents will be considering additions for their homes. If there are any questions on this, please contact Darrell Fleming or Matt Thomas (Architectural Review Committee). The City of Madison requires that any issues relating to our architectural covenants must be approved before submission for a building permit to the City of Madison.

# Note from Dane County Executive Kathleen Falk

## Major projects to become reality in 2007

As you read this, the search for a site for a new County Huber/AODA facility is under way. Public input is so important and it began with the recent release of the Dane County Board's site subcommittee recommendation.

Offenders will continue to be held accountable for their crimes, but inmates in this new facility also will receive treatment to break their addictions to alcohol and other drugs. Why? Because statistics show addictions such as these play a major role in why people commit crimes. Breaking the cycle of addiction will help break the cycle of reoffending.

Another project under way this new year is a new nursing home for our most vulnerable citizens. This new facility will be built on the grounds in Verona of the current Badger Prairie facility that needs to be replaced.

Dane County again will make headlines when we become the first county in the state to implement "Priority Fire Dispatch." This system is aimed at helping our 911 dispatchers determine the appropriate kinds and number of emergency equipment to send to the immediate crisis while – and this is the key feature – making sure equipment remains at the ready for the next call.

Gov. Jim Doyle is being asked to approve our proposal to create the Capital Area Regional Planning Commission. Dane County is growing by more people each year than any other county in the state so long-range land use planning involving the entire county is essential to preserving our quality of life. The key mission of this very important commission will be to work with our local leaders countywide to craft plans for urban growth that protects our land, lakes, and groundwater.

# Neighborhood Crime Watch Program and Home Security Presentation by the Madison Police Department

It was discussed at the last annual homeowner's association meeting that the crime rate in our neighborhood has unfortunately increased greatly in the past couple of years. To help reduce this trend in increasing crime, it was recommended that we investigate starting a neighborhood watch program. All Wexford residents are invited to attend a presentation by the Madison Police Department on this topic at the Alicia Ashman Library on Wednesday, April 4<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm.

Police Officer Mary Anne Thurber will give a presentation on what is involved in getting started with a neighborhood watch program. Some of the topics to be discussed include: how to recognize and report suspicious activities in the neighborhood, implementation of crime prevention techniques, benefit of being a good neighbor, how to be a good witness, and home/apartment/condo security and crime prevention.

A neighborhood watch does not require frequent meetings. No one will be asked to take any personal risks to prevent crime. The neighborhood watch leaves the responsibility of apprehending criminals with the police.

A Block Captain will need to be selected for this program. The responsibilities of the Block Captain include: being the spokesperson for the group, serve as a liaison between law enforcement and the group, and maintaining a master list of active members. If you are interested in volunteering for this role, please let it be known at this meeting.

We hope to see many of you there.

## Arboretum Event Information

Many migrant birds are returning. By the second week in March, you can usually see geese, cranes, killdeer, song sparrows, bluebirds and woodcocks in the Arboretum and surrounding area.

Usually April bursts with spring events — more birds returning and the first wildflowers in bloom. Look for pasque flowers on the west Grady Knoll, and hepatica in Gallistel Woods early in the month.

Wingra and Gallistel woods are usually full of spring ephemeral wildflowers by the third or fourth week of April. These are plants that complete their yearly growth cycle in about six weeks in the spring when sunlight gets to the woodland floor before the trees develop leaves.
